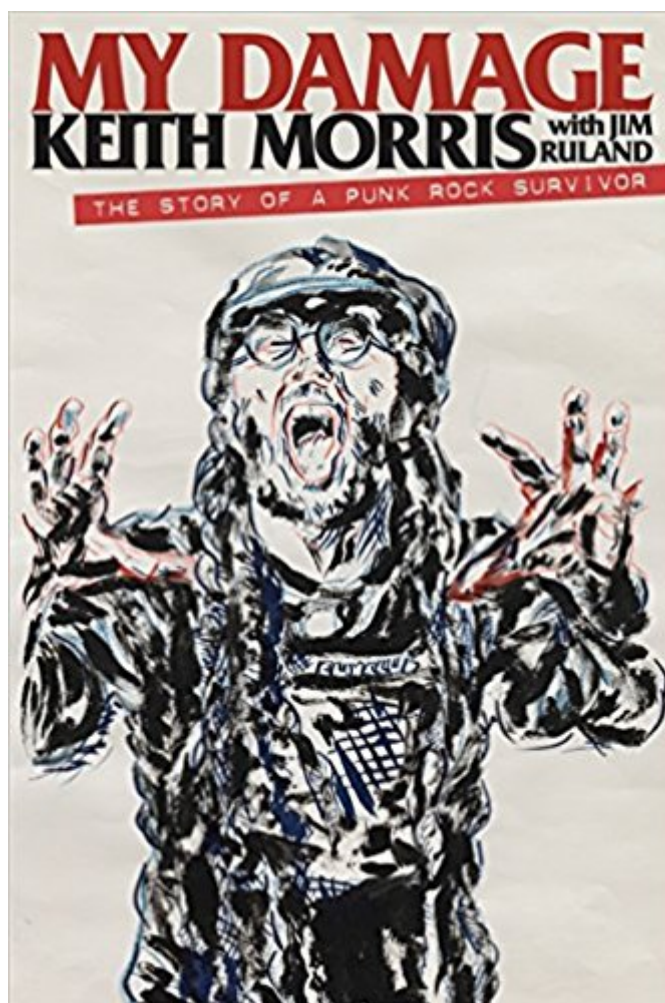

Synopsis

Keith Morris is a true punk icon. No one else embodies the sound of Southern Californian hardcore the way he does. With his waist-length dreadlocks and snarling vocals, Morris is known the world over for his take-no-prisoners approach on the stage and his integrity off of it. Over the course of his forty-year career with Black Flag, the Circle Jerks, and OFF!, he's battled diabetes, drug and alcohol addiction, and the record industry...and he's still going strong. *My Damage* is more than a book about the highs and lows of a punk rock legend. It's a story from the perspective of someone who has shared the stage with just about every major figure in the music industry and has appeared in cult films like *The Decline of Western Civilization* and *Repo Man*. A true Hollywood tale from an L.A. native, *My Damage* reveals the story of Morris's streets, his scene, and his music—as only he can tell it.

Keith Morris is a cofounding member of Black Flag, the most recognizable name in West Coast punk, and the Circle Jerks, which cemented his reputation at the forefront of hardcore vocalists. He has recorded over fifteen albums, appeared on countless albums and compilations, and has a half-dozen film credits to his name. The intensity of the music produced by his latest bands OFF! and FLAG are equal to his best work from the '70s, '80s, and '90s, and add to a legendary career that is still being carved out one gig at a time. Jim Ruland caught the punk rock virus when his mom took him to see the Ramones when he was 15. He has been writing for punk rock zines like Flipside since the early '90s and has written for every issue of Razorcake, America's only non-profit independent music fanzine. He is the author of the award-winning novel Forest of Fortune and the short story collection Big Lonesome and is the curator of the irreverent reading series Vermin on the Mount.

Keith Morris's book, *My Damage: The Story of a Punk Rock Survivor* is Keith's contribution to setting the record straight about his involvement in the LA punk scene. The first thing you need to know about Keith is that first and foremost he loves music and that his passion for music led him to see Bowie, Iggy Pop and others at their creative peaks. His name-dropping at the beginning of the book let's you know he is as much of a fan as he is a bonafide punk rock persona. I was most interested in his re-telling of his involvement of the later Masque days and the beginnings Black Flag in Hermosa Beach. There are moments where Jim Ruland, Morris's semi-Ghost writer really captures that era of Hermosa Beach. To really take in the landscape of Hermosa Beach I would suggest Spot's photo book, *Sounds of Two Eyes Opening* that features HB and early Black Flag to really take it in. The biggest fault of the book is that Morris only briefly touches on what the early 80's LA punk/hardcore scene was like and doesn't talk enough about his relationship to its players. Instead he decides to go the predictable route of his fall into drinking, cocaine abuse and why the Circle Jerks never got it together. While many of the stories are entertaining and rightly solidify Morris as the true author of the historically contested song "Wasted", the truth is, I wanted to read more about the early 80's punk scene and Morris's musings on his relationship with the players (well known or not) and less of his using stories (as entertaining as they are). The book loses steam when Morris recounts his involvement in the Hollywood scene of the

90 f&AçÃ â ÑÃ â,,çs and his relationship with the Hangmen, Inger Lorre and the Nymphs and his bands outside of the Circle Jerks namely Bug Lamp and Midget Handjob. If you f&AçÃ â ÑÃ â,,çre a fan your like me, you already bought the book. However, I can f&AçÃ â ÑÃ â,,çt help but think Morris missed an opportunity to go a little deeper and tell a few more stories about the early 80 f&AçÃ â ÑÃ â,,çs punk rock scene and its players for those of us that weren f&AçÃ â ÑÃ â,,çt there.

Regarding his time in the Circle Jerks, he covers the early days pretty well, but doesn't seem to have too much else to say about the post-"Group Sex" days. All in all, the less you know about Keith Morris, the more you'll get out of it. Even if you've already read "SPTW" and seen the Circle Jerks documentary, it's still worth hearing about Keith's life straight from the man himself.

Keith is simply badass. If you dug the Circle Jerks back from the original hardcore days, this is a must read. I knew about him since I was once an acquaintance, but I didn't know THIS much about him. Thanks for still being alive Keith. You are a true American treasure to a lot of us old punkers.
